

A CLOSE EYE ON THE MS LEGISLATURE These are a few of the House and Senate bills we're watching

HB 176 – Gender dysphoria; require school personnel to notify parents of student who request to be referred to as different gender or nonhuman. This bill aims to force personnel to potentially out LGBTQIA+ children to their parents – which could very well put those children in harm's way. It also states that teachers must have permission of the parents to use a child's preferred pronouns.

HB 193 – Statewide testing program; require tests to be translated and print into primary spoken language of ELL students. This bill is pretty self-explanatory and has an enormous potential to raise the state test scores of ELL students who know subjects like algebra or biology or US history (in high school, for example), but who struggle to communicate that knowledge in English. The bill requires for any non-ELA state test to be translated and administered in the student's primary language.

H 460 – Charter schools; require MAEP funds to be transferred to student's home school district when student disenrolls. This bill requires charter schools to return any funding back to the school district when a student leaves a charter school after 3 months and returns to his home school (the school where the student resides).

H 534 – African-American Studies and Racial Diversity; require SDE to develop curriculum for implementation in public high school. This bill requires MDE to create a high-school elective course that teaches African-American studies. The bill requires the course to cover content beginning before the Civil War and running into the modern day.

H 537 – Civics; require State Board of Education to develop curriculum for public middle and high school students. This bill requires MDE to create a civics course for middle and high school students. It's one for us to revisit because some of the wording looks <u>tricky</u>.

H 557 – "Mississippi Promise Scholarship Act of 2024"; establish to provide tuition assistance for tuition-free community college attendance. This bill establishes a scholarship to cover the costs of tuition to community colleges for students who qualify. The scholarship will be paid for by funds from the Postsecondary Education Financial Assistance Trust Fund as well as a percentage of monies coming from the Alyce G. Clarke Mississippi Lottery Law.

H 561 – Retirement; school bus drivers shall be eligible to be members of PERS and vest after 15 years.

H815 – This is the text of the bill: The liberty of parents to direct the upbringing, education and care of their children is a fundamental right. (That's it). This is dangerously broad and could have parents demanding specific curricula in the classroom.
H 897 – Appropriation; Jackson Public School District for increased mental health services for students throughout district. This bill appropriates \$5 million to JPS for increased mental health services for its students.

SB 2007 –Mississippi Student Absentee Voter Act; enact. This bill would allow college students absentee ballots. SB 2062 – Artificial Intelligence in Education Task Force Act; enact. This bill creates a task force to establish within the state to evaluate the potential applications of AI in K-12 and higher education and to develop policy recommendations for responsible and effective uses by students and educators.

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MDE has proposed some clarifying changes to Appendix F of the State Accountability Standards regarding state testing procedures, and those changes are out for public comment. MS Supreme Court Hears Arguments

Last week, the Mississippi Supreme Court heard oral arguments in a lawsuit challenging a \$10-million appropriation to private schools for infrastructure improvements. State Attorney General Lynn Fitch had appealed a lower court's ruling that the 2022 appropriation by the Mississippi Legislature was unconstitutional. Section 208 of the Mississippi Constitution states that "no funds shall be appropriated toward the support of...any school that at the time of the appropriation is not conducted as a free school."

Attorneys arguing on behalf of private schools asserted:

- that the appropriation was not unconstitutional because, rather than being appropriated directly to private schools, it was run through the Mississippi Department of Finance and Administration with instructions to send it to private schools - a ridiculous suggestion that the Legislature could avoid complying with the Constitution by laundering appropriations through state agencies; and

Recently, a member was named in a civil suit along with JPS for an incident that occurred during the work day. JPS **refused** to represent their employee until the Jackson Federation of Teachers stepped in.

As a result of the union's swift work, the union got JPS to represent the employee, like they were supposed to do, and ultimately the lawsuit was thrown out of court.



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 that the lawsuit should be tossed out, alleging that the members of the group bringing the suit, Parents for Public Schools (unrelated to The Parents' Campaign), were not harmed by the appropriation.One needn't drive far to witnesses the absurdity of this argument. Children of parents bringing the suit attend public schools on campuses with massive infrastructure deficiencies and severely dilapidated facilities that have fallen into disrepair because of insufficient funding. Legislators have claimed for decades that they cannot afford to fully fund our public schools, let alone provide funding for infrastructure.

If public money is to be appropriated to any school for any reason, it should go to public schools, which operate for the public good. Our State Constitution demands it. The Supreme Court is expected to announce its decision in the case no later than the end of June 2024.
